## THE PANEL EXPERTS



### **Lars Bay Larsen**

#### **Vice-President, Court of Justice of the European Union, Luxembourg**

Judge Larsen has been an official at the Ministry of Justice, a lecturer, then Associate Professor in Family Law at the University of Copenhagen. He held the positions of Head of Section at the Advokatsamfund (Danish Bar Association), Head of Section at the Ministry of Justice, Head of the Police Department and Head of the Law Department at the Ministry of Justice. He represented Denmark in the K-4 Committee, the Schengen Central Group and the Europol Management Board. He sat as judge at the Højesteret (Supreme Court) before becoming a CJEU judge in January 2006.

### **Mattias Guyomar**

#### **Judge, European Court of Human Rights**

Judge Guyomar had been a president of the 10th Chamber of the Judicial Division of the Conseil d'État (2016-2020), before being appointed as a Judge at the European Court of Human Rights on 22 June 2020. Before that he was a member of the 6th and 10th Chamber (2011-2016), a Director of the Legal Documentation and Coordination Center (1999-2002) and a rapporteur at the Judicial Division (1996-1999). He has been a Government Commissioner ("advocate general"), then Public Rapporteur at the Administrative Judicial Division and the Jurisdiction Disputes Tribunal (2002-2011) and an Associate professor of Public Law, University Paris-Sud XI, Faculty Jean Monnet, (2004-2012). He has been the Secretary General of the French Institute of Administrative Science (2013-2020) and the Secretary General of the French Electoral Commission (1998-2020). Since 2012 he is an Associate professor of Public Law at University Paris 2 - Panthéon – Assas.



### **Liesbeth Steendijk**

#### **Judge, Judicial Department of the Council of State, Netherlands**

Judge Steendijk has been sitting as judge since 1995 and she has dealt with cases of criminal and administrative law, including immigration/asylum. Since 2001 she has been appointed Vice-president of the Zwolle first instance Court and since 2011, she has been Member of the Judicial Department of the Council of State. Judge Steendijk has been a lecturer at the Judicial Studies Centre (SSR) Zutphen and from 2000 onward she participated in several international seminars in various European countries on training of judges and asylum law.
